- Develop Principles/Goals


Phase 1 (July 2017 - June 2018)

Clair-Maltby Vision

Clair-Maltby will be a **vibrant**, **urban** community that is integrated with Guelph's southern neighbourhoods, as well as having strong connections to Downtown, employment areas and the rest of the City.

The Natural Heritage System and the Paris Moraine provide the framework for the balanced development of **interconnected** and sustainable neighbourhoods.

The area will be primarily **residential in character** with a **full range and mix of housing types** and a variety of other uses that **meet the needs of all residents**.

A **system of parks, open spaces and trails** will be interwoven throughout to provide opportunities for active and passive recreation.

What is the open space system?

An interconnected system of parks, trails, and greenspace that are accessible to the public within Clair-Maltby.







Assumptions

- This process is not intended to develop detailed programming and trail mapping for open spaces
- The Natural Heritage System is not a component of the open space system





Assumptions Continued

- Open space planning is not influenced by existing or potential future property lines or plans for development
- The financial feasibility still needs to be explored and will impact any final recommendations





What is the Natural Heritage System?







Definitions

Community Parks

- provide facilities for active recreation at an intermediate and/or major level such as sportsfields, recreation and/or community centres
- may contain natural areas, beaches, trails, picnic areas, public recreation facilities and passive areas.





Parks in Clair-Maltby

- There are 8 neighbourhood parks planned in Clair-Maltby
- Aim to achieve a minimum of 10 hectares of Community Park space in Clair-Maltby
- A Community Park should have access to a collector or arterial road, not be located within the NHS or within the Gordon Street corridor

 What are the benefits of creating one large community park vs. two mediumsized parks vs. three smaller parks?





Applying the Criteria: One Large Community Park

 Would you prefer one large community park, two medium-sized parks, or three smaller community parks? Explain your rationale.






Refining Criteria

Moraine Ribbon







Why should we plan for a moraine ribbon?

- To provide a compatible land use next to the Natural Heritage System
- To provide opportunities for active or passive recreation (including trails) beside rather than within the NHS
- An innovative and unique way to increase open space in Clair-Maltby





What is the function of the moraine ribbon?

- Comprised of a series of generally continuous linear interconnected open spaces
- Will run adjacent to the Natural Heritage System and may include interconnected park areas, stormwater management areas, cultural heritage resources, and natural areas





Function of the moraine ribbon continued

- Will accommodate a trail to accommodate active recreational movement
- May include resting and/or gathering areas and views of the natural environment and the Paris Moraine





Preserving the Moraine Ribbon

 If the moraine ribbon needed to be interrupted, how would you decide where to do so?
