#### PUBLIC MEETING UNDER THE DEVELOPMENT CHARGES ACT TO HEAR DELEGATIONS WITH RESPECT TO THE CITY'S PROPOSED NEW DEVELOPMENT CHARGES BY-LAW

Gary Scandlan of Watson & Associates reviewed the study process in developing the proposed development charges by-law. He highlighted the addendum report changes and the updated development charges. He reviewed the various provisions included in the draft by-law and highlighted an example of possible phasing of the industrial development charge. He reviewed the three options for phasing in the charges.

Marc Dexter was present on behalf of DTZ Barnicke Limited, Belmont Equity (HCBP) Holdings Limited, Cooper Construction Limited, Industrial Equities Guelph Limited and Courtney's Alberta Company Inc. with respect to the proposed development charges by-law. He advised that the industrial stakeholders group is concerned with the impact the implementation of the proposed new development charges would have on the City's ability to attract and retain industrial development. He suggested that phasing in the industrial charge would meet the goals of the City's strategic plan. He requested that the City phase in the industrial development charges as outlined in Option 1 of the staff report.

Susan Watson expressed concern with the amount of funding that the taxpayers would have to cover if development charges were phased in. She suggested that the developers need to pay their share and that if a phasing in of the charges is approved the City would need to show the benefits received from development. She advised that she is in support of phasing in the charges for the industrial sector but not for residential.

Mark Godman, President of the Guelph & District Home Builders Association expressed concern with the magnitude and timing of the proposed new development charges increase. He suggested that this proposed new charge would have a great impact on their sector. He requested that the City consider phasing in the residential development charge similar to that proposed for the industrial sector.

Tom Krizsan was present on behalf of the Guelph Wellington Developers Association and advised that the development charge cost is passed along to potential home purchasers. He suggested that the development charges would be restrictive while the Federal Government is introducing simulative packages. He requested that the City phase in the residential development charges over five years.

Lee Piccoli of Fusion Homes suggested that their industry will not be able to withstand the magnitude of the development charge increase. He further suggested that the City consider the concept of a building permit triggering mechanism similar to what the City of Toronto is considering.

Robert Mullin of Smith Valeriote was present representing the home builders and developers association and suggested that the proposed development charges would have a profound impact on their industry. He suggested that the residential sector is an industry within itself and should be protected. He requested that the residential development charge be phased in similar to Option 1 in the staff report for the Industrial sector.

Dr. Hugh Whiteley suggested that the City work with the Association of Municipalities of Ontario to get a new development charges financing structure. He also requested that sustainability be built into financing capital projects and that the City re-examine the included projects in respect of the various conservation initiatives. Tiffany Page advised that it is becoming more difficult for people trying to live on fixed incomes. She suggested that consideration should be given to how decisions will impact everyone.

#### **REVIEW / RECOMMENDATIONS FOR 2009ARTS / CULTURE CITY GRANTS**

#### **REPORT PREPARED FOR ECO COMMITTEE MEETING** December 10, 2009

In accordance with the agreement between Guelph Arts Council and the City of Guelph, Guelph Arts Council has reviewed all 2009 Arts / Culture grant applications submitted to the City.

#### Process

All panel members read all 21 applications on their own. The panel then met on November 19 to review and analyze the grants, looking at basic eligibility and City criteria as stated in the 2002 City Grant Policy, including some specific factors agreed upon by the panel:

- number of people served (audience) number of volunteer hours
- size of budget - size accumulated surplus/deficit - degree of fundraising - diversified sources of revenue
- realistic grant request (or not)
- organizational structure
- artistic accomplishment
- risk factor / accountability
- duplication of services

- tourism draw

- need for funding
- organizational life cycle / growth (or not)
- youth involvement
- new ideas / concepts
- willingness to collaborate
- completeness / presentation of application

As in previous years, we found that the applications fell naturally into several categories: Festivals; Umbrella-type / Educational Organizations; Community Organizations; and Other.

The final grant recommendations are included in the attached Chart. We have also included a few very brief comments but would be prepared to elaborate further at the upcoming meeting of the City's ECO Committee, should that committee's members have any questions or concerns.

### A few general comments:

- applications taken together represent the rich cultural mix that characterizes Guelph
- general overall improvement in applications in the past couple of years
- very positive approaches
- good proposals
- good documentation of work in community
- good examples of collaboration/partnerships especially important in current economic climate
- greater effort to be accountable
- realistic requests
- financial information still the weakest part of most applications (e.g. incomplete information, errors in transferring figures to summary page).

Guelph Arts Council feels confident that our evaluation was comprehensive and fair to all those who applied, and that the attached recommendations represent a fair and equitable distribution of available funds.

#### Committee Guidelines:

Due to the volume of 2009 requests and the reduced budget (\$22,500 less than 2008 budget), the committee organized an evaluation process which analysed each event in terms of the economic and social benefits offered back to the City. Events were allocated points based on scope, economic impact, participation, seasonality, volunteerism and uniqueness. In addition, the committee capped the maximum grant amount at \$15,000 and allocated funds according to the ranking achieved through the evaluation system- events that scored higher in terms of benefits delivered received larger amounts than those who scored lower.

#### **Committee Recommendations:**

- Grant funds should not be issued without a contract- a simple contract would suffice and would ensure that funds could be returned if the event does not deliver as indicated in its application (Example- in 2008 \$12,000 was issued to the Guelph Rowing Club to put on a National Masters Championship which was cancelled) The contract could also indicate that the City expects certain requirements in exchange for the funds such as proper recognition through logo placement on marketing materials and collection of participation data
- Special projects should be serviced by an additional allocation of funds outside of the Special Events Grants and reviewed by a different committee
- An historical request for funding of \$800 by the Guelph Horticultural Society should be picked up in a more logical place in the City budget such as in Parks. It seems unfair to request that the group continually come back to the city each year through the grant process to ask for a small amount of funding that directly benefits the city's beautification.
- The request for funding of Doors Open Guelph also triggered a look at how this event is funded. Throughout its history it has been supported through the Special Event Grants Process and through sponsorship by Tourism Services. The committee recommends that a partnership of matching funds from Special Events Grants and Heritage Guelph be explored for 2009 as Doors Open is an event which elevates the profile of the city's architectural heritage. Heritage Guelph is a logical fit for this particular event and should be involved in financing it.
- The grant process should move to electronic application and reduce the waste of paper involved in producing six copies and resources currently required to apply
