

STATEMENTS OF REASONS FOR DESIGNATION

1 QUEBEC ST., 99-101 NORFOLK ST. (Duncan-McPhee and Gallery One)

This two-storey, two-part building of local limestone is a distinguished example of mid-nineteenth century architecture in Guelph. The southern portion, (99 Norfolk Street) was built in 1853 by John Catchpole, tinsmith, grandson of Henry Catchpole who bought the land from the Canada Company in 1836. Tradition claims it to have been the first stone structure erected on Norfolk Street.

An impressive extension (1 Quebec Street) was added in 1864, at the corner of the property, by George Howard, Guelph's mayor when the City was incorporated in 1879. The structure, built with superior cut-stone masonry and crowned with a handsome cornice and curved roof, has fine proportions and a gracefully curved corner facade.

In 1954, the total building was rehabilitated by Duncan-McPhee Interiors. Both units retain their historic character with only limited, sympathetic alterations.

The designation covers the northerly and south-westerly facades of stone at No. 1 Quebec Street and Nos. 99-101 Norfolk Street, the roof profiles and the stone parapets of the end walls which frame the roof. The interior, with other exterior walls to the south-east and east, are excluded, as is the brick addition of later date to the east.

ELEMENTS OF PROPERTIES AND BUILDINGS BEING DESIGNATED

A. 1 Quebec St. and 99-101 Norfolk St.


- (a) The limestone facades facing Quebec St. to the north and facing Norfolk St. on the south-west, including window and door openings. At 1 Quebec St., it is permitted that compatible alterations may be made in the window and door locations at the ground floor or alterations which bring these windows and doors closer to the original design. The present Colonial store front design dates from 1954.
- (b) The stone parapets which extend above the roof at the eastern end wall, at the dividing wall between the higher building at 1 Quebec St. and the lower building to the south and at the southeasterly end wall. It would be permitted to cover or alter the eastern end wall and/or south-easterly end wall.
- (c) The present form and profile of the roofs and the cornice of 1 Quebec St.



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



- 1830 Canada Company awards a contract to Horace Perry to build Guelph's first grist mill on west side of the Speed River.
- 1832 William Allan purchases the timber-framed mill and water power on the west side of the Speed River, Allan's sons David and John were also trained as millers and millwrights.
- 1835 The distillery is constructed on the east side of the Speed River. The development is credited to David Allan.
- 1841 A carding mill is added to the southwest side of the distillery.
- 1855 The east side of the Speed River is annexed to Town of Guelph.
- 1859 After William Allan's death, the mill and distillery business is taken over by sons David, John and James.
- 1860 A two-storey addition is made on the distillery.
- 1869-70 A four-storey stone rectifying house with a 30' brick chimney is added.
- 1876 David Allan suffers a stroke and the business is liquidated within

- 1881 Armstrong & McCrae Woolen Co. purchases the eastern portion of the mill
- 1881-1892 Alterations and additions are made and the company is renamed Guelph Woolen Mills Company Ltd.
- 1899 Sold to George Forbes who became a partner with Augustus R. Woodyatt.
- 1902 Sold to George Forbes and John Taylor, incorporating the businesses of A.R. Woodyatt Company and Ironworks into Taylor-Forbes Company Ltd.
- 1904 Taylor-Forbes constructs a large new foundry and machine shop on the site.
- 1953 Taylor-Forbes is sold to W. C. Wood Company Ltd.

a rich cultural heritage

This site was home to many different businesses. It started as one of the earliest industrial developments on the East side of the Speed River and one of the first in St. Patrick's Ward. The previous buildings on site evolved over a course of almost 200 years as business changed

and owners adapted the site for new uses. At its peak under the Taylor-Forbes Company Ltd., the site was once home to Guelph's largest employer and one of the largest manufacturers of hardware Even though the factories have in the entire Commonwealth. The all closed down, it still stands as many changes over time made for a diverse built heritage that

reflected the site's many uses as well as industrial architecture from early 19th century to early 20th century.

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


