17 Mary Street

Riverslea Estate Cultural Heritage Landscape (Homewood) Revised text for heritage designation plaque

Once a private home set within a large estate landscape, Riverslea was built for Guelph businessman James Goldie in the Richardsonian Romanesque style. The landscape includes two red brick grounds buildings and a stone coach house at Arthur Street North, supporting the private home. Within the larger Homewood campus are three distinct yet related cultural heritage landscapes including the Riverslea Estate.

17 Mary Street

Designated heritage property (Brooklyn and College Hill Heritage Conservation District)

Staff Comments

The real property at 17 Mary Street is one of the original lots from the Estate of Mr. Robert Thompson or the "Thompson Survey", registered as Plan 37 in 1856. The land title abstracts indicate that Thompson sold Lot 28 to George Sayers, a carpenter, in 1858.

Cooper's 1862 Map of the Town of Guelph shows the footprint of the original portion of the existing house and Cooper's revised 1877 map shows the 2-storey extension to the north.

Guelph's Fire Insurance Plan from 1922 (revised in 1929) indicates the wood frame house footprint with a roughcast stucco exterior. The 1946 Fire Plan shows a simple wood frame garage behind the house.

The original front door, its surround and larger front window openings are still seen in the Couling Inventory photograph from 1974. At that time the exterior was clad in insulbrick. Since that time, the house has been clad in horizontal metal siding and all original doors and all but one original windows have been replaced with modern metal units.

After conducting an interior site visit with the owner to document the current physical integrity of the building, the Senior Heritage Planner found that apart from the original 1877 exterior form, no original exterior or interior heritage attributes have survived and the dwelling has undergone numerous unsympathetic alterations and renovations that have removed almost all of the building's heritage character-defining elements. Although the pre-1946 detached garage is extant it is not considered to be a significant part of the original property.

It is staff's opinion that the existing dwelling contributes very little to the historic Mary Street streetscape and no longer has sufficient architectural, design or contextual cultural heritage value to warrant its retention within the Brooklyn and College Hill Heritage Conservation District. Staff have no objection to the proposed demolition of the house and garage so that the property owner may design a replacement dwelling that is compatible with the historic streetscape and that is in keeping with the HCD Plan and Guidelines through the heritage permit process.











Plan of the Estate of Mr. Robert Thompson or the "Thompson Survey" registered as Plan 37 in 1856.





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
1862 Map (Cooper)




1877 Map (Cooper)
