## **Executive Summary**

#### **Purpose of Report**

To provide background and information regarding the Tier 3 Water Budget and Local Area Risk Assessment (LARA) Report completed for the Lake Erie Region Source Protection Committee (SPC).

#### **Key Findings**

A Tier 3 LARA has been completed for the water supplies of the City of Guelph and Guelph/Eramosa Township and will be presented to the Lake Erie Region Source Protection Committee on April 6, 2017 for information. The project followed technical rules and guidance documents provided by the Ministry of Environment and Climate Change (MOECC) under the Clean Water Act (CWA). The report will be posted on the SPC web site following its release (https://www.sourcewater.ca/en/index.aspx).

The purpose of a Tier 3 LARA is to compare available groundwater and surface water supply capacity to the municipal demand from existing, future and planned drinking water systems. Where the ratio of water demand to water supply capacity is high, subwatersheds have been classified as having a Moderate or Significant potential for water quantity stress.

A comprehensive, integrated groundwater and surface water computer model has been developed for the City and surrounding area and represents a significant new tool to manage the local water resources.

An area of vulnerability, also known as the "Local Area" (WHPA-Q) and an Intake Protection Zone for water quantity (IPZ-Q) have been delineated. Under one of the model scenarios that are required to be simulated under the technical rules, one of the City's municipal wells was unable to pump at the allocated pumping rates under

average and drought conditions. As a result, WHPA-Q and IPZ-Q have been assigned a Significant Risk Level.

The Tier 3 LARA report has defined drinking water quantity threats as any activity in a vulnerable area that reduces groundwater recharge to an aquifer or any consumptive water demand. Consumptive demands are activities that extract water from an aquifer or surface water body without returning that water to the same aquifer or surface water body.

#### **Financial Implications**

The Tier 3 LARA project has been funded through provincial grants via the Grand River Conservation Authority. This water quantity assessment will eventually lead to the development of water quantity policies in the City's Source Protection Plan and the City will incur future costs to develop and implement the policies. Additional information will be brought back to Council in 2018 regarding the water quantity policies and potential cost implications.

## Report

Drinking water source protection is about protecting the quality and quantity of our municipal drinking water supplies. As part of the CWA, a "Tiered" approach has been developed for conducting water budgets in source protection areas. There are three tiers in the process and each successive tier narrows the scope of the study and the science becomes more complicated. Each tier is more detailed and provides more certainty. As a requirement under the CWA, the purpose of a Tier 3 LARA is to compare available groundwater and surface water supply to the municipal demand from existing, future and planned drinking water systems. Where the ratio of water demand to water supply capacity is high, subwatersheds have been classified as having a Moderate or Significant potential for water quantity stress. The Upper Speed River Assessment Area of the Grand River Watershed was classified as having a Moderate potential for water quantity stress in a Tier 2 Water Budget Study and therefore, the Lake Erie Region Source Protection Authority was required to complete a Tier 3 LARA.

This report describes the Tier 3 LARA completed for municipal drinking water systems of the City of Guelph (City) and Guelph/Eramosa Township (GET). The City's water supply system consists of 23 wells constructed within overburden aquifers and deep bedrock aquifers. The City also has a water supply intake on the Eramosa River. GET has municipal systems located in the communities of Rockwood and Hamilton Drive, which are serviced by four and two bedrock water supply wells, respectively.

The scope of work completed in this Tier 3 LARA followed direction provided by the Province's Technical Guidance, Technical Rules and Technical Guidance Bulletin. The report was reviewed by three external Peer Reviewers appointed by the Province.

As part of the Tier 3 LARA, surface water and groundwater modelling tools were developed to help assess the sustainability of the municipal water sources. The models were developed based on a detailed characterization of the groundwater and surface water systems. The models were designed to replicate the water balance for the detailed hydrologic and/or hydrogeologic conceptual model for a number of scenarios: average and drought conditions; existing and committed demand (i.e. allocated rates); and planned future demand.

The Groundwater Vulnerable Area in this Tier 3 LARA is represented by a Wellhead Protection Area for water quantity (WHPA-Q) which is circular in shape with a diameter of approximately 20 km around the City (see Attachment Figure 1). There are also three, small WHPA-Q around the GET's Rockwood Wells. The WHPA-Q is the area of influence of each municipal well plus the area of influence of wells that it intersects. The Local Areas in this Tier 3 LARA also have a surface water Intake Protection Zone for water quantity (IPZ-Q) which is the drainage area and associated recharge area that contribute to the surface water intake (IPZ-Q) (see Attachment Figure 2).

The Tier 3 LARA scenarios determined that the City's Queensdale Well is unable to pump at the allocated pumping rates under average and drought conditions. All other municipal wells of the City and the communities of Rockwood and Hamilton Drive are expected to be able to pump at their current and allocated pumping rates under all conditions, but there is a high level of uncertainty with the results for the City's Arkell Well 1. As a result, WHPA-Q and IPZ-Q are assigned a Significant Risk Level.

The scenario results are supported by historical operating experience in the City where many of the wells have pumped at their allocated rates over prolonged periods of time. The primary municipal water supply aquifer is protected in most areas by the Vinemount Formation aquitard which reduces the vulnerability of the supply to drought. While all municipal wells except the Queensdale Well are expected to meet their allocated rates, water levels at the City's Arkell Well 1, Arkell Well 8, Arkell Well 14, Arkell Well 15, Burke Well, Carter Well, Emma Well and the GET's Bernardi Well 3 may be more susceptible to drought conditions. With the addition of new Arkell Spring Ground wells, the City's water supplies have the capacity to meet the 2031 estimated water demand.

Recharge reductions, in response to future land developments (i.e. increase in impervious surfaces), have a minimal impact on groundwater levels for the municipal pumping wells. The Gasport Formation aquifer is protected in most areas by the Vinemount aquitard which reduces the impact of reduced groundwater recharge on water levels in the aquifer.

There is a potential that municipal well pumping may decrease groundwater discharge to wetlands and cold-water streams. It is predicted that there will be a steady-state decrease in groundwater discharge to the cold water streams in and around the City and reductions of shallow groundwater levels greater than 1 metre around Provincially Significant Wetlands in the northwest, northeast and southeast

areas of the City. However, the modelling analysis indicates that there is a high level of uncertainty with respect to the predicted impacts to cold water streams and wetlands.

The Risk Assessment scenarios in the Tier 3 LARA illustrate that all but one municipal well (the City's Queensdale Well) can meet allocated rates under average and drought conditions. There is also a high level of uncertainty that Arkell Well 1 will be able to the allocated rates as well. Therefore, a Risk Level of Significant is assigned to the WHPA-Q and the IPZ-Q.

According to the Clean Water Act, Drinking Water Threats that are or would be classified as Moderate or Significant need to be identified for each vulnerable area. As outlined in the MOE Technical Rules, the definition of a drinking water quantity threat is any activity that reduces groundwater recharge to an aquifer or any consumptive water demand. Consumptive demands are activities that extract water from an aquifer or surface water body without returning that water to the same aquifer or surface water body. Since WHPA-Q and IPZ-Q are assigned a Risk Level of Significant, all consumptive demands or recharge reductions within these areas are classified as Significant Water Quantity Threats (SWQT).

#### **Next Steps**

Information from the Tier 3 LARA report (including the water budget results, the delineation of the WHPA-Q and IPZ-Q and the SWQT) will be used to update the Approved Grand River Assessment Report.

Following the completion of the Tier 3 LARA, a new project will be initiated (known as the Risk Management Measures Evaluation Process (RMMEP)) to provide technical input to assist the Lake Erie Region Source Protection Committee and municipalities in formulating policies regarding existing, new or revised water takings within the Local Area(s). This RMMEP process is undertaken when a Local Area is assigned a Significant Risk Level in a Tier 3 Assessment. The project is intended to be locally driven, and a collaborative process amongst municipal partners and the Lake Erie Source Protection Region.

The RMMEP aims to examine water quantity threats that were identified in the Risk Assessment, rank them according to the threats that have the greatest impact on the municipal supplies and propose a recommended set of risk management measures that could be implemented to reduce the Risk Level assigned to the Local Area(s) from Significant, to Moderate or Low. The results of this exercise are then documented in a report known as the Threats Management Strategy.

The Clean Water Act requires that the Source Protection Plan include the development of effective policies to address SWQT. The Threats Management Strategy is then used to guide the development of Source Protection Policies for water quantity which upon approval will be included as an update to the Approved Grand River Source Protection Plan. The Source Protection Committee, working with the City and the Townships, will prepare an update to the Source Protection Plan that will set out policies to address the SWQT.

## **Financial Implications**

The Tier 3 LARA project has been funded by provincial grants via the GRCA. This water quantity assessment will eventually lead to the development of water quantity policies in the City's Source Protection Plan and the City will incur future costs to develop and implement the policies. Additional information will be brought back to Council in 2018 regarding the water quantity policies and potential cost implications.

#### **Consultations**

The Tier 3 LARA report was prepared in cooperation with the Grand River Conservation Authority (as the Lake Erie Region Source Protection Authority), the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry, the Ministry of Environment and Climate Change, the City of Guelph and Guelph/Eramosa Township. Municipal peer reviews were conducted by the Townships of Guelph/Eramosa, Puslinch and Erin.





## **Executive Summary**

#### **Purpose of Report**

This report shares with Council information on the development of an innovative mobile application (app) prior to public release, as previously described in the Council approved 2016 Water Efficiency Strategy. 'watr' is a residential water use engagement and efficiency software tool developed by Focus21 Inc. in collaboration with Guelph Water Services. watr allows City of Guelph water customers to view their water consumption data via their smartphone and determine if they are an efficient user of water based on key metrics. The app is scheduled to be released to customers in March 2017.

#### **Key Findings**

Guelph Water Services has collaborated with Focus21 Inc., a local technology startup company specializing in information engagement systems, to create a mobile app called watr. The aim of the app is to increase our customer's access to their household water use information and thereby encourage water efficiency.

watr pairs household water consumption with simple, customer (subscriber) provided profile information to plot water use using social comparison. Subscribers will be prompted to take advantage of the City's water efficiency rebates, notified of changes in water use levels during the summer season, and offered water efficiency news and conservation messaging.

watr will be available (once approved by the respective companies) for iOS (Apple) and Android-based mobile devices via the appropriate app stores. One approved, Water Services will work with Focus21 to promote the app to Guelph residential water customers with access to their online Guelph Hydro account through various platforms including social media.

## **Financial Implications**

The development of watr is funded in part by Ontario Centre of Excellence (OCE) SmartStart Seed Fund and the City of Guelph. Funding for the watr app was approved by Council as part of the 2016 Non-Tax Supported Water Services Operating Budget.

## Report

The City of Guelph primarily relies on a renewable, but finite groundwater source for its drinking water supply. Water conservation and efficiency provides the ability to reclaim water capacity, reduce our environmental impact and decrease utility operational and capital investments. Further to the Water Supply Master Plan (WSMP), water conservation and efficiency assists in meeting the water needs of our growing community.

As outlined in the Council approved 2016 Water Efficiency Strategy (WES), community engagement and public education is a critical component of the water efficiency tool box; it will allow the City to continue to meet water reduction targets as outlined in the Council-approved Water Supply Master Plan. With residential water use currently accounting for 51 per cent of the City's total water consumption, lack of awareness of household water consumption and how it compares to that of the average household is frequently cited as a deterrent to water efficiency.

In alignment with the open government objectives of the City's 2012 Strategic Plan, and 2010 Water Conservation Public Education Strategy, Water Services initiated work on a mobile–based application (app) to increase customer access to information about household water use in late 2015. The app uses customer water account information to provide subscribers with suggestions for conserving water and reducing bills. Subscribers will be able to view customized information based on user-provided attributes of their household and their household's most recent and historical water billing data.

To develop this app, the City worked with Focus21 Inc., a local technology start-up company specializing in information engagement systems. Focus21 created watr – the mobile app - to assist in connecting residents to their water bill and use. Using monthly household water use data and engagement psychology, this app will assist in achieving the overall goal of increasing household water efficiency. With the use of similar apps in the United States connecting customers to their water bill, research has found the following:

- Five per cent average annual water savings (after one year only) has been experienced by app users;
- App users are two times more likely to participate in rebate programs this could create an 8.7 per cent reduction in water use for the City based on historical consumption and current rebate programs offered (i.e., Royal Flush and Blue Built Home); and
- App users are six times more likely to participate in water audit programs (such as the eMERGE home visit).

In order to achieve the potential savings as noted above, watr offers two-way, intuitive communication through the following features:

- A free app download for iOS (Apple) and Android mobile devices;
- Simple sign-up using an active water account developed in partnership with Guelph Hydro (the City's water billing and collections agent);

- Create a user profile through answering a simple question to establish household occupancy;
- Gauge household water use using social comparisons (household size, average Guelph household); and
- Push notifications including water efficiency-related news and emergency messaging with respect to water (i.e., frozen services, outside water use level changes, water quality issues etc.).

As household water use information is collected by Guelph Hydro through the monthly billing data collection cycle, watr user reports will be updated.

watr subscribers participate at their own discretion and will be notified at the time of sign-up that all personal information will be collected in compliance with the Municipal Act and safeguarded in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act. All information will be kept confidential and will only be used for the purposes of managing the subscriber's watr application account and personal water efficiency profile contained therein.

The release of the watr app for iOS (Apple) and Android devices has been completed in two phases:

Phase 1: Beta testing with a select group (approximately 15 users – the Water Conservation and Efficiency Public Advisory Committee and City staff). Focus21 monitored app activity and solicited feedback to identify any bugs and/or shortfalls and review participant's household water use. To determine how watr performs, Focus21 interviewed beta testers.

Phase 2: Incorporating feedback from the beta test, a full roll-out of watr is anticipated in late March 2017 and will be available to all Guelph Water residential customers with access to their own water account free through the Apple App Store and Google Play Store.

As part of implementation, Focus21 will provide technical support to sustain operation of the watr and make improvements as warranted. Staff will be provided metrics on subscribership and return use metrics of subscribers, evaluating what water savings, if possible, can be attributed to use of the app, and will be reported through Water Services' Annual and Summary Report.

In conjunction with Focus21, staff have developed a promotion plan for watr which includes a launch of the app, promotional material, social media campaign and advertisements. Soft launch of the watr app will commence once readily available through the respective mobile application virtual stores. More generous and aggressive promotion of the app will commence in April and continue throughout the year on an ongoing basis.

## **Financial Implications**

The development of watr is funded in part by Ontario Centre of Excellence (OCE) SmartStart Seed Fund (\$35,850), and the City of Guelph (\$29,940). Furthermore, the City has provided staff time in-kind to develop and promote watr to other municipal partners at trade conferences, provincial and federal working groups. Funding for the watr app was approved by Council as part of the 2016 Non-Tax Supported Water Services Operating Budget.

Additional funding from the City will be determined based on uptake of application.

#### **Consultations**

Water Services' and Focus21 consulted with and received support from Corporate Communications, as well as with Guelph Hydro Inc. throughout the development, testing and roll-out phases of the watr app.

Furthermore, Water Services' staff and Focus21 have reviewed the app with the Water Conservation and Efficiency Public Advisory Committee and Water Services Staff throughout product development and beta testing.

I am writing to advise that Peel Regional Council approved the below resolution at its meeting held on Thursday, March 9, 2017. This resolution is provided to you for your information only.

#### **Resolution 2017-185:**

Whereas the Community Water Fluoridation Committee (CWFC) was established on February 11, 2016 to closely examine the current practice of water fluoridation in the Region of Peel and make recommendations to Regional Council on community water fluoridation in Peel;

And whereas, over the past year the CWFC has reviewed information and research related to the effectiveness, safety and cost of community water fluoridation using hydrofluorosilicic acid and heard from a number of experts and stakeholders;

And whereas, Regional Council has supported the Committee's recommendation to advocate to the provincial government that they clarify and assume their legislative role in community water fluoridation;

Therefore be it resolved, that while waiting for the Province to respond to the above request:

- a) The Region of Peel undertake to reduce the concentration of fluoride in Peel's lake-based municipal water supply, adjusting it to the lowest level in accordance with provincial standards for the prevention of tooth decay:
- b) And further, that the Region of Peel modify the fluoride additive used in the Region's water supply to reduce the levels of residual components; substituting a fluoride additive from calcium fluoride or such other source as will have the desired effect of reducing the levels of residual components;
- c) And further, that Peel Public Health reaffirms its commitment to ongoing monitoring of the oral health status of Peel residents especially children of school age as well as relevant evidence on the effectiveness and safety of community water fluoridation;
- d) And further, that the CWFC suspend meetings until such time as the Province clarifies its role in community fluoridation; or until such time as Regional Council reconvenes the Committee;
- e) And further, that copies of this resolution be circulated to the Region of York (which receives a portion of their water supply from the Region of Peel), all Ontario municipalities and all Peel-area MPPs.
