How long does it take a ticket to arrive?	Tickets are expected to arrive within 30 days or less of when the violation occurs.
If I receive a ticket, what are my options?	Pay the fine according to the instructions outlined on the ticket.

	Request to attend court to plead not guilty and have a trial.
Why does the registered plate holder receive	The ASE system does not allow for the capture of images of

What are the penalties for an ASE?	The offence notice will include the set fine, court costs and the victim fine surcharge. Because these offences are committed in a community safety zone, the set fine will be doubled in price.
Are there insurance consequences?	The insurance consequences, if any, are between you, as the vehicle owner, and your insurance company.
